



CARES ACT PANDEMIC UNEMPLOYMENT ASSISTANCE UPDATE FROM DEPARTMENT OF LABOR: 2/25/2021

The Department of Labor has released new ways workers can qualify to receive Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (PUA).

Pandemic Unemployment Assistance is money given to workers impacted by COVID-19. It works similar to regular Unemployment.

You may qualify for PUA benefits if:

You have refused to return to work because the workplace was not following COVID-19 guidelines.

You have refused a job offer because the workplace was not following COVID-19 guidelines.

You work for a school, and have been unable to work because of COVID-19 school closures.

You have been getting fewer hours, or been laid off because of COVID-19.

> You are not eligible for regular Unemployment benefits.

What you need to do:

- Find your state's Unemployment Insurance Program
- Complete a PUA application
- State the reason you are eligible (one of the reasons above)

Additional Information:

- Updated guidelines for who is eligible for Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (PUA)
 - Adds three new reasons workers can qualify
 - Apply retroactively to the beginning of the PUA program (3/27/2020), as long as you filed a claim before 12/27/2020
 - If you didn't, you can only claim from 12/6/2020 onward

Workers can qualify for Pandemic Unemployment Assistance for these NEW reasons:

- 1. Refusing to return to a workplace that is unsafe, or to accept a job somewhere that is unsafe
 - a. For example, if the workplace doesn't observe local, state, or national COVID-19 safety recommendations, whichever is most stringent
 - b. Workers can self-certify that the workplace was unsafe, and then qualify for PUA
- 2. Workers who provide services to schools or education agencies, and are having their income impacted by closures
 - a. If you have worked for a school, you can qualify even if you don't have a contract with them or a "reasonable assurance" to work for them the next year
 - i. You must self-certify that you are eligible
 - b. If you have a contract with a school and are in-between work times, you do not qualify UNLESS you also have another employment (not a school) and are losing hours there
- 3. Workers whose hours have been reduced or who have been laid off because of the pandemic
 - a. Includes workers who are laid off because their workplace is partially closed (temporarily or permanently), or who have been getting fewer hours
 - i. Can self-certify that you are eligible
 - b. Many workers would qualify for regular unemployment compensation in this scenario this protects workers who don't, including:
 - i. Those who don't have enough earnings to qualify for regular unemployment
 - ii. Those who have been previously disqualified from regular unemployment
 - iii. Those who have already claimed the maximum amount of regular unemployment compensation

Workers can qualify for Pandemic Unemployment Assistance for these OLD reasons:

1. Not eligible for regular Unemployment Compensation, Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation, or Extended Benefits,

Including those who:

- a. Have already claimed as much as they can of these benefits
- b. Are self-employed, INCLUDING independent contractors and gig workers
- c. Are looking for part-time work
- d. Don't have enough wage history to qualify for benefits from their work

- e. Otherwise don't qualify for benefits
- 2. Workers who are out of work because of "COVID-19-related reasons," including
 - a. Self-employed workers (including independent contractors and gig workers), who have had significantly less work than usual because of COVID-19
 - i. Must report weekly earnings and show they are less than usual

Workers DO NOT qualify for PUA if they:

- 1. Can work virtually (telework) with pay
- 2. Are receiving paid sick leave
- 3. Are receiving full pay even if they are not working
- 4. Are receiving other unemployment benefits
- 5. Are not generally eligible for unemployment benefits because they are not authorized to work in the U.S.

To become eligible, WORKERS must:

- Complete a PUA application
 - If you haven't already filed a claim
 - This includes verifying your identity
- Self-certify that you are eligible
 - If the state finds you not eligible, you can appeal
- Once accepted, there are more forms you have to fill out
